the Regiment occupied defensive positions northeast of WONJU and conducted patrols. On 28 February the Regiment was ordered into Division reserve and moved to a position in the rear of the 1st and 7th Marines which continued the Division attack to secure limited objectives.

2. CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

DATE

- Feb 1 a. Regimental Operation Plan 1-51 (enclosed) was issued to all units changing sectors of responsibility and directing operations beginning at 1800, 2 February.
- b. The 1st Battalion was ordered to move to CHACHON-DONG (DQ 9395) the morning of 2 February to find, fix and destroy any enemy in that area (See CO 5thMar dis 011236I, enclosed). The 1st Battalion directed an air strike at 1400 on the village ONGCHON (TA 8110-L-0) as a result of patrol reports of enemy there. Strike results were reported as follows: 4 roadblocks destroyed, approximately 30 enemy killed and the village completely burned.
- c. The 2nd Battalion's advance party departed its bivouac area at POHANG at 0730 and arrived in its new assigned bivouac area (TA 9580-J-3) at YONGCHON at 0915. The remainder of the battalion was moved in four serials the first departing at 0805 and the last serial clearing the old area at 1130. All elements closed the new area by 1330. At 1435 the 2nd Battalion was given a warning order to prepare to send one company to vicinity PALGONG-SAN to guard a U. S. Army radio relay station in that vicinity. At 1600 the warning order was modified directing the company be sent to Hill 930 (TA 7583). At 1652 "F" Company with a Tactical Air Control Party attached departed for this locality. The company detrucked at HAYANG and proceeded on foot to its destination arriving at 2205. The company found that the relay station was located at TA 7984 instead of the location previously reported.

d. The 3rd Battalion, located at SINNYONG (TA 8188), sent "G" Company (Reinf) to eliminate a reported roadblock at SOGYE-DONG (TA 6897). The company found no roadblock at that location and returned at 2145.

e. On this date intelligence sources reported that the enemy (North Korean guerrillas) were moving generally toward PALGONG-SAN and raiding villages for food and other needs. Up to this time no concentrations of more than 300 had been observed by 5th Marines patrols. Efforts were being made by the enemy to capture or destroy our patrols. One 11-man patrol of "B" Company that failed to return from a four-day reconnaissance on 31 January still was missing on this date. Prisoners interrogated were untrained and unaware of their unit's mission. They reported that only 13 men out of a platoon of 50 ever had fired a rifle and that half of the platoon had been conscripted since 15 November 1950. Civilian police reported that the enemy in the Regiment's patrol sector actually were bandits with no formal liaison with regular North Korean troops north of ANDONG. Their combat efficiency was considered low and it was believed that their operations would be limited to harassment and "hit and run" tactics.

f. Effective strength this date: H&S Co.--34 officers, 260 enlisted; 1st Bn.--41 officers, 1,034 enlisted; 2nd Bn.--41 officers, 1,014 enlisted; 3rd Bn.--41 officers, 1,020 enlisted; AT Co.--4 officers, 101 enlisted; 4.2" Mortar Co.--4 officers, 137 enlisted. Total: 153 Marine, 12 Navy officers; 3,434 Marine, 136 Navy enlisted. (Authorized strength: 158 Marine, 11 Navy officers; 3,597 Marine, 136 Navy enlisted.)

g. As the month opened the Regimental Motor Transport Maintenance Officer reported that repair parts for vehicles were in short supply.

h. At 012025 a dispatch was received from Division directing the Naval Gunfire Team attached to the 5th Marines to return to its parent unit, Air Naval Gunfire Liaison Company.

- Feb 2 a. The 1st Battalion was given the mission of moving to CHACHON-DONG (DQ 9395) with its three rifle companies proceeding by three different routes and clearing the enemy out of the hills. At 0830 the advance party of the battalion departed for CHACHON-DONG and arrived there at about 1000. Headquarters and attached elements arrived at the new area at 1500. "B" Company proceeded to SINNYONG and moved into the mountains in the direction of CHACHON-DONG before halting for the night. The company had the mission of clearing the enemy from high ground at TA 7894 eastward to CHACHON-DONG. "A" Company departed at 1445 for HAMOE-DONG (TA 7897) to set up defensive positions preparatory to moving eastward to TAPPYONG (TA 8804) to join the rest of the battalion when it moved to that vicinity.
- b. A 2nd Battalion motorized patrol of one reinforced platoon departed at 0805 to reconnoiter the MSR from YONGCHON to UISONG and the Alternate MSR from UISONG to YONGCHON via KUSAN-DONG and CHACHON-DONG. The patrol picked up foot patrols of the 1st and 3rd Battalions completing patrol missions during the period. No enemy was contacted.
- c. The 3rd Battalion sent a squad patrol to Hill 536 at 0830 to contact elements of the 2nd Battalion at TA 7984. The patrol returned at 0900 having completed its mission. Patrols also were conducted in the battalion's sector but no enemy was contacted.
- d. Organic and attached transportation was being used during this period to its maximum on supply runs and in movements of subordinate units.
- e. The Regimental Tactical Air Control Officer reported that radio voice communications for air support purposes were being stretched to the maximum as a result of the battalions being spread about 35 miles from the Tactical Air Direction Center. He also reported that the $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton 4x4 radio trucks had been giving the TACP units trouble. He attributed this trouble to the rough treatment given the vehicles while on patrols on the rough mountain roads.

f. On this date the three regimental chaplains were staying one each with a battalion. The Catholic chaplain was with the 2nd Battalion. One of the Protestant chaplains served the 1st Battalion, Regimental headquarters, and attached units.

g. The Regimental Motor Transport Maintenance Officer reported that vehicle spare parts were in short supply. He recommended that a repair platoon from the 1st Motor Transport Battalion be attached.

h. The Medical Section began vaccinating all personnel in the Regiment against smallpox as ordered by Division.

- Feb 3 a. At 1300 a motorized patrol from the 1st Battalion made contact with approximately one squad of enemy at TA 9100. The patrol killed 10 enemy with no Marine casualties. At 1330 "A" Company contacted enemy at TA 8298. An air strike was called with excellent results. Contact with the enemy was broken by nightfall. At 1500 a helicopter resupply of "C" rations was made to "B" Company, 1st Battalion, in the mountains of PANGA-SAN.
- b. The 2nd Battalion remained in its area and conducted unit training. A motorized patrol was sent to UISONG and returned with no enemy contacts reported. At 1910 the battalion was ordered to leave one reinforced platoon in position at DQ 7887 to protect the Eighth Army radio relay station there and return elements other than this to the battalion area on 4 February.
- c. The 3rd Battalion patrolled in its sector with no enemy contacts.
- d. At 2000 orders were received attaching one truck company less one platoon to the 5th Marines. The company, "A" Company, 7th Motor Transport Battalion, was directed to proceed immediately to the 5th's CP upon detachment from the 1st Marines at ANDONG.
- e. On this date 10 trucks were used for supply runs. The Regiment received 75 drums of diesel fuel, 215 drums

c. The Regimental Supply Section submitted requisitions to Division supply for items of Class II equipment needed because of the rugged terrain the infantry battalions were operating in. These included: packboards, plastic water bags and an extra canteen per man. Also, a consolidated requisition for field shoes to replace shoe-pacs was submitted. The rear echelon area was inspected by a representative of the Division Sanitation Office. The area was in good condition and the inspector was pleased.

d. Supporting artillery adjusted fire on an enemy munitions dump with good effects, causing several explosions and destroying munitions.

Mar. 24 a. All elements of the 5th Marines remained in their positions consolidating deliberate defensive works and patrolling to the front of their positions. Some sniper fire was reported in the zone of the 1st Battalion and "D" Company, 2nd Battalion, received some small arms and automatic weapons fire. No casualties resulted, however, and the enemy dispersed. Operation Order 22-51 (enclosed) was issued at 2150, directing patrols for 25 March.

b. A shower unit of "A" Company, 1st Engineer Battalion, went into operation this date and a schedule was set up to allow all units to get showers.

c. Personnel report for period 17 to 24 March: KIA--1, WIA--10, non-battle--66, replacements received--14 officers and 3 enlisted, USMC, returned to duty--61 enlisted USMC.

d. Effective strength this date: 160 Marine officers, 3,653 enlisted; 12 Navy officers, 130 enlisted. Authorized strength: 158 Marine officers, 3,597 enlisted; 11 Navy officers, 136 enlisted.

e. Recommendations were processed for the following number of awards: 2 Navy Cross, 3 Silver Star, 1 Legion of Merit, 2 Navy-Marine Corps Medal, 15 Bronze

Star, 5 Letters of Commendation.

f. During the period 17 to 24 March 57 civilians were treated by the Regimental Aid Station.

g. A letter was received (CG 1stMarDiv ltr P6-3 to CMC, Subj: Establishment of identity, case of the personnel interred as unknown at TANGGOK, KOREA, cemetery) reporting that 10 American Marines and one Korean National Policeman found on 7 March among 26 tortured and murdered victims of North Korean guerrillas in the vicinity of INWA-DONG (TA 6905) had been tentatively identified as the "B" Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, Patrol No. 8 that was reported missing on 31 January 1951 (See Jan. 31, par. c., January Historical Diary of 5th Marines). This reconnaissance patrol became overdue on 31 January when a motorized patrol that was supposed to pick it up failed to make contact. According to information obtained from civilians by First Lieutenant Wilton A. Herring, Jr., MPO, U. S. Army, Detachment Comdr., UISONG area, Co. "A", 772nd MP Bn., the patrol was captured on 30 January near JIHA-DONG. According to a civilian woman who was reported to have witnessed the patrol's capture, the Marines walked into a North Korean ambush on a trail and surrendered when trapped. There were no witnesses to the killings. The bodies were found in shallow graves with the hands bound in front of them. The victims had been stabbed many times by knives and apparently, finally shot to death. One Marine had a big rock resting on his chest and another was buried up to his eyebrows in a standing position. They were believed to have been killed about 20 February when the guerrillas moved out of the area. Some of the other (Korean) bodies in the group had been mutilated with ears and noses cut off and eyes cut out.

h. CG 1stMarDiv dis 241050I increasing the number of personnel to be rotated in the Third Rotation Draft by 20 per cent was received. In accordance with this directive CO 5thMar dis 241240I (enclosed) was issued, increasing the numbers to be rotated from each unit.

301700I, enclosed). The 3rd Battalion commenced movement at 301400.

b. The 1st Battalion continued reconnaissance patrols throughout its patrol zones. Daily motor patrols were sent to UISONG. No enemy contacts were reported. The 2d Battalion conducted training in scouting and patrolling, tank-infantry and small unit tactics. Schools were held for officers and staff noncommissioned officers.

c. Intelligence reports indicated that approximately 2,000 to 3,000 guerrillas were operating in the 5th Marines zone. Also, it was reported that an estimated 1,500 to 2,000 more might be moving into the Regiment's zone from the sector of the 7th Marines. The enemy seemed to be under centralized control but operating in small groups. The enemy's most likely capability seemed to be that of attacking the MSR on the CHONGSONG (ER 0531)-POHYONSAN (DR 9801)-HONBYONG (DQ 8190) axis.

Jan 31

a. Elements of RCT-5---the 1st Battalion, 11th Marines; Company "A", 1st Engineer Battalion; H&S Company, 5th Marines; 4.2" Mortar Company; Anti-Tank Company; "C" Company, 1st Medical Battalion; "D" Company, 1st Tank Battalion; "B" Company, 1st Motor Transport Battalion--commenced movement to YONGCHON in four serials with a serial departing each hour beginning at 0900. Advance parties for these elements had departed for YONGCHON at 0800. The last elements closed the bivouac area at YONGCHON at 1715.

b. The 1st Battalion motor patrol to UISONG departed, in two sections, each section dropping off foot patrols along the MSR and the alternate MSR. At 1125 the 1st Battalion stated that "C" Company reported it had established a perimeter defense around CHACHON-DONG.

c. The 1st Battalion picked up 6 foot patrols this date; one "B" Company patrol of 11 men was overdue and not picked up. This patrol was still missing at the close of this report. One "A" Company patrol reported
